Dr David Robertson, Chair of the Mosman Environmental Foundation gave a talk on declining biodiversity and unsustainable agricultural production in NW NSW with particular reference to old growth Coolabah and Black Box - now an endangered ecological community. Dr Robertson presented an interesting perspective on the issues for farmers and graziers, including the complexities and variety of legislation they have to get their heads around.

Dr Robertson commented on the enthusiasm of our group, as evidenced by the many questions and the queue of people with more questions after the talk was finished. Exciting news

Mosman Parks & Bushland was among the first group of four recipients to receive a grant from the Mosman Environmental Foundation.

Our grant is for \$9,790 and will pay for professional weeding of Asparagus fern and other weeds at Chowder Head (Gooragal), Sydney Harbour National Park, in areas that are too inaccessible and dangerous for our regular team of volunteers. It is particularly significant and appropriate for this work to be done in an area where the Bradley sisters made their discoveries about bush regeneration. Eileen, in particular, was credited at her death in 1976, with having left the 40 acres of Chowder Head in virtually pristine condition. In 1995, a group of volunteers, consisting of MPBA members and others, was formed under the auspices of NPWS to work on part of Chowder Head near Morella Road, which had become particularly weed infested. Bush regeneration is painstaking work, but the group is proud of its achievements in "Bringing Back the Bush" to this site. With the significant help that the grant will bring to the group's efforts, this headland has the potential to become an example and model of what can be achieved in bushland.

Landcare Conference site visit

Kicking off such opportunities is a Site Visit as part of the National Landcare Conference on Tuesday, 23rd August. Anne Cook, our in house historian and our authority on the Bradley sisters, and I, will be leading the walk through the site. The day trip starts with our site and then goes on to Lane Cove Bushland, the Coal Loader at North Sydney and ends at Kelly's Bush. The connecting theme for the sites being the role that preserving bushland plays in saving public land.

Andrew Scott, North Sydney's bushcare officer has put this excursion together for Landcare and has organised a booklet and video to accompany it.

We would be delighted to show off our beautiful Chowder Head to any interested members or friends. Please let me know if you would be interested in joining a walk at a future date.

A new Committee Member

We are delighted to welcome Jenni Hagland to the MPBA Committee.

Jenni has been taking an active role in Mosman environmental initiatives, with a particular emphasis on climate change. I asked Jenni for a summary:

She began her environmental career in 2007 when she started with the Carbon Disclosure Project (now known as the CDP in London) and worked alongside Paul Dickinson and Tom Rivett-Carnac (now climate change superstars). Her involvement with environmental initiatives in Mosman began in 2015 when she and her family moved here. She started a parents' sustainability group at Mosman Public School which fundraised and got solar for the school in 2019. In the same year she began working with Zero Emissions Sydney North as Program Leader for Schools which offers schools free downloadable guides, resources and consulting to help them become more sustainable. In 2020 she piloted the Zero Emission Schools Network here in Mosman and all schools in the Mosman LGA take part in the Network. Currently she is also the Queenwood's Parents Association's Sustainability Coordinator. She completed her Climate Reality Leadership training (Al Gore's climate training program) in 2020. She became a member of MPBA in 2020 after joining our planting team on the "Zali slopes" below Rawson Park.

I think you will understand how pleased we were when Jenni accepted our invitation to join the committee.
